### WRITE AN AURORA STORY



# **Lesson Summary:**

Students categorize aurora legends and write their own aurora stories.

# **Objectives:**

The student will:

- create a classroom aurora story;
- demonstrate skills in sentence and paragraph structure by following the basic steps in the writing process; and
- write an original aurora story.
