DIAMANTE



Lesson Summary:

Students write a Diamante to reinforce new vocabulary and concepts learned during the Crowns of Light unit. A Diamante (the Italian word for diamond) is a form of unrhymed poetry consisting of seven prescribed lines. When the poem is finished, it forms the shape of a diamond.

Objectives:

The student will:

- write a Diamante to reinforce new vocabulary and concepts learned during the Crowns of Light unit;
- use a variety of adjectives and nouns to describe the concepts expressed in the Crowns of Light unit; and
- use a variety of verbs to describe the concepts expressed in the Crowns of Light unit.
