Let's Make a Time Capsule



Overview:

Students put together a time capsule of pictures, items of importance, and stories collected from their families.

Targeted Alaska Grade Level Expectations:

History

Objectives:

The student will:

record data about themselves; and

· gather information from family members.

Materials:

· Large waterproof container

Camera

STUDENT WORKSHEET: "All About Me"

Activity Procedure:

- 1. Ask students if they know what a time capsule is. If not, explain a time capsule is a container that holds information and is buried or put away for a length of time. It helps people remember about people, places, or things. Tell children they are going to make a time capsule about themselves and their local area to be buried in a safe place for five years.
- 2. Brainstorm with children about the kinds of things to include in a time capsule. Students may say things such as pictures of themselves, stories they have written, facts about themselves, their favorite things, etc. List responses on the board.
- 3. Distribute copies of the STUDENT WORKSHEET: "All About Me." Read it aloud and have students fill it out. Younger students will need adult assistance with this task.
- 4. With the camera, take a picture of each child and attach it to the back of his or her worksheet. The students should place their completed sheets into the time capsule.
- 5. Explain students will be putting information about their families and the local area in the time capsule. They will be interviewing their families to do this. Distribute copies of the STUDENT WORKSHEET: "Family Interview" for students to take home.
- 6. When all the student and family information is gathered, bury the time capsule in a place that will not be disturbed for five years. Be sure to put the date the capsule is buried on the inside and outside of the container. Leave a note about the time capsule in the school office or another safe place to remind school officials that the time capsule should be opened in five years.
